
## The Deep Listening Circle

Deep and respectful listening which builds community


For Aboriginal people Deep Listening comes naturally It's about walking on the land

Softly quietly


And listening to the stories around the campfire




We've got to listen to the wind in the trees

Boon Wurrung Arts and Culture Centre.



























The next day, a Deep Listening Circle ritual is held in the City of Stonnington, hosted by the Aboriginal community.

On a fine winter's day, the Circle is taken out for some fresh air around the coast of Phillip Island.







will play a role in the
Shearwater Festival 2015,
being held on Phillip Island
on the 21st and 22nd November.

The Shearwater Festival is a cultural, creative and environmental event which brings communities together to celebrate the return of the shearwaters from their 15,000 kilometre migration.





The two-day Festival includes a Street Parade, workshops, performances, guided walks and talks to the shearwater rookeries.



The Shearwater Festival involves environmentalists, creative artists, musicians, Indigenous Elders, community members and school children.
