

The Shearwater Festival connects artists, Elders and children in a celebration of short-tailed shearwater birds who fly 15,000 kilometres in their annual migration from Bass Strait in the Southern Ocean to the Bering Sea in the Northern Pacific.

The Shearwater Festival uses the Arts to contribute to Indigenous language revival and cultural regeneration, facilitate inter-cultural exchange and to raise environmental awareness.











Shearwater Festival 2015 took place in Cowes and Cape Woolamai on Phillip Island, beginning on the evening of Friday 20th November and running until Sunday afternoon, 22nd November.











The two-day Festival included a twilight cruise, a street parade, workshops, commissioned work, collaborations with Aboriginal linguists, performances, talks and guided walks to the shearwater rookeries.





The Shearwater Education Program 2015 brought together children, Indigenous cultural advisors, linguists, artists and environmentalists in a ten-week intensive program leading up to the Shearwater Festival.







In the Shearwater Education Program 2015, school children participated in creative, cultural and environmental activities, focussing on the shearwaters, Indigenous culture and the natural environment.

The Shearwater Festival and Education Program has deepened the school community's knowledge and understanding of indigenous culture by having the experts such as Ranger Graeme, Aunty Fay, Kutcha Edwards, Laura, Lisa, yourself and Camille Monet come into the school/class and talk to the students about the specific Shearwater topic or activity they were helping with. The visitors were able to impart their knowledge and share their expertise with our students through rich discussions and hands on activities.

Students in the Junior School, grades 1-4 were involved in a variety of activities such as writing of haiku poems, art and craft puppet making, creation of songs, using apps and technology such as pic collage, composing Shearwater short tales, Circle of Life, Trans-Pacific digital message exchange between Newhaven College and Canadian children provided opportunities for learning and community engagement in and through the Arts and has built awareness and appreciation of local and global environmental issues. Students were able to make connections with the local environment and what they were learning at school.

On the day of the parade these were further reinforced and afterwards by listening to the presenters all contributed to further strengthening the partnership between the home and the school by involving the parents in the student's experiences and education.


